

Dear Brothers and Sisters ...



On the 22nd May 2022, I had the privilege of attending the beatification of Pauline-Marie Jaricot in Lyon, France, which coincided with the annual General Assembly of the National Directors of the Pontifical Mission Societies. 120 directors gather each year for the General Assembly, usually in Rome, but this year the assembly was held in Lyon, to coincide with the beatification of our founder, Pauline-Marie Jaricot.

It was indeed a spirit filled occasion where we were able to walk in the footsteps of Pauline Jaricot; visit the churches where she worshipped and gave her life to the Lord; and experience some of the rich spiritual history of the church in Lyon.

Pauline was just 23 years old when her idea to engage all the baptised to pray for the mission of the church and to make a small monetary contribution, from their charity, to support the church in poorer countries, brought about a transformation in the life of the church. Her simple but passionate acts of charity in a small town in France blossomed into one of the most impactful missionary organizations in our world today, the *Society for the Propagation of the Faith*, one of the four Pontifical Mission Societies.

At the beginning of the General Assembly, Fr Tadeusz Nowak, the Secretary General of the *Society for the Propagation of the Faith* unveiled a new Icon of Pauline

Jaricot, which was presented to the Pontifical Mission Societies by the PMS National Office in France.

In this issue of *Our Mission* we will have an opportunity reflect on the life of Pauline Jaricot beginning with the message that Pope Francis wrote to the National Directors of the Pontifical Mission Societies who were gathered in Lyon for their annual assembly.

We will also take a look at the new Icon and explore the significance of the different side panels, before taking some time to reflect on the beatification ceremony, and share some of the insights of Cardinal Tagle, the prefect of the *Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples*, who presided at the Mass, and Archbishop Olivier de Germain, the metropolitan archbishop of Lyon, who welcomed the beatification of Pauline Jaricot ‘wholeheartedly.

Pauline-Marie Jaricot

A Great Missionary



In his written address to the National Directors of the Pontifical Mission Societies who were gathered for the Annual General Assembly and the Beatification of Pauline-Marie Jaricot, in Lyon, Pope Francis drew attention to the missionary spirit that inspired Pauline Jaricot and which is still the animator of the Pontifical Mission Societies today.

In his letter he wrote “Pauline Jaricot liked to say that the Church is missionary by nature (*Ad gentes*, 2) and that therefore every baptized person has a mission, indeed, is a mission. Helping to live this awareness is the first service of the Pontifical Mission Societies, a service the Pontifical Mission Societies perform with the Pope and in the name of the Pope.”

Referring to the jubilees that are being celebrated this year, the bicentenary of the *Society for the Propagation of the Faith*, the centenary of its elevation, together with the *Society of Holy Childhood* and the *Society of St. Peter the Apostle*, to the rank of “Pontifical, the 400th anniversary of *Propaganda Fide* and the beatification of Pauline-Marie Jaricot, Pope Francis highlighted three aspects that, “thanks to the action of the Holy Spirit, have contributed so much to the spread of the Gospel in the history of the PMS.”

He first addressed missionary conversion. He made the point that “The goodness of mission

depends on the journey of going out of oneself, on the desire not to centre one's life on oneself, but on Jesus, on Jesus who came to serve and not to be served (cf. Mk 10:45). In this sense Pauline Jaricot saw her existence as a response to God's compassionate and tender mercy: since her youth she sought identification with her Lord, also through the sufferings she went through, in order to ignite the flame of his love in every man. Here lies the source of the mission, in the ardour of a faith that is not satisfied and that, through conversion, imitates day by day in order to channel God's mercy on the streets of the world.


But this is possible —second aspect —only through prayer, which is the first form of mission. It is no coincidence that Pauline placed the *Society for the Propagation of the Faith* alongside the *Living Rosary*, as if to reaffirm that mission begins with prayer and cannot be achieved without it (cf. Acts 13: 1-3). Yes, because it is the Spirit of the Lord who precedes and enables all our good works: the primacy is always of his grace.”

Pope Francis made the point that missionary conversion and prayer lead to the third aspect, charity. “Pauline initiated a collection of offerings on a large scale and in a creative form, accompanying it with information about the missionaries' lives and activities. The offerings of so many simple people were providential for the history of the missions.”

The pope concluded, “Dear brothers and sisters who are part of the General Assembly of the PMS, I hope that you walk the path traced by this great missionary woman, allowing yourself to be inspired by her concrete faith, her audacious courage, her generous creativity. Through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, Star of Evangelization, I invoke the blessing of the Lord upon each one of you and I ask you, please, to pray for me.”

The unveiling of the official portrait of Blessed Pauline Jaricot

During Mass the official portrait of Blessed Pauline was unveiled. Following the unveiling of the portrait, Mayline Tran, the young girl who was miraculously healed through the intercession of Blessed Pauline Jaricot in 2012, brought forward, along with her family, a relic of blessed Pauline – a small cross which was given to Pauline by St John Vianney before his death in 1859.

Pauline-Marie Jaricot, founder of the *Society for the Propagation of the Faith* and the *Living Rosary* was beatified in Lyon, France, on Sunday the 22nd May, 2022.

Cardinal Luis Antonio Tagle, Prefect of the *Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples* presided at the Mass. More than 50 bishops, 2000 priests and 13 000 of the faithful from around the world, attended the Mass and the beatification ceremony.

Cardinal Tagle welcomed the 120 National Directors of the Pontifical Mission Societies (PMS) who had come to Lyon in honour of their founder, before reading the following message from Pope Francis:

“We grant that the venerable servant of God, Pauline-Marie Jaricot, founder of the *Society for the Propagation of the Faith* and of the *Living Rosary* for the support of the missions, true disciple of Christ, witness attached to the primacy of God and to human dignity, be hence forth called ‘Blessed’, and that she may be celebrated on the 9th January of each year, in the places and according to the rules defined by law. In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen.

Given in Rome at the Lateran, on the 24th April, the 2nd Sunday of Easter, and Feast of Divine Mercy, of the year 2022, the 10th of our pontificate, *Francis*.”

In his homily Cardinal Tagle said that Pauline-Marie Jaricot was a “living testimony to the power of love that identifies with Jesus. She was a woman who lived, loved, and let Jesus Christ, the Word of God, dwell in her and through her.” He went on “Jaricot was obedient to the Holy Spirit, who encouraged her to spread the Gospel and serve the poor through her creative ideas and initiatives.”

Pope Francis' Message for World Mission Day 2022



On the 6th of January 2022, on the Solemnity of the Epiphany, Pope Francis promulgated his *Message for World Mission Sunday, 2022*, which will be celebrated on Sunday 23rd October, 2022. The Theme for this year's celebration is "*You shall be my witnesses*" (Acts 1:8).

The theme reflects the Risen Jesus' last conversation with his disciples, before ascending to Heaven: "*You shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and shall be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth*" (Acts 1:8).

The Pope takes time to reflect on the three aspects of this statement, which help to illustrate the nature, call to action and goal of each of us who has been baptised.

Beginning with the central passage, "**you shall be my witnesses**", the Holy Father draws attention to the fact that the mission of every disciple is linked to the mission of Christ himself. He reminds us "Christ was the first to be sent, as a "missionary" of the Father (cf. Jn 20:21), and as such, he is the Father's "faithful witness" (cf. Rev 1:5). In a similar way, every Christian is called to be a missionary

and witness to Christ." He goes on to say, "And the Church, the community of Christ's disciples, has no other mission than that of bringing the Gospel to the entire world by bearing witness to Christ. To evangelize is the very identity of the Church."

Focussing on the plural form of the mandate "you shall be my witnesses", the Holy Father emphasises the communitarian and ecclesial

nature of the disciples' missionary vocation. He makes the point that "Each baptised person is called to mission, in the Church and by the mandate of the Church: consequently, mission is carried out together, not individually, in communion with the ecclesial community, and not on one's own initiative." He goes on "In addition, the disciples are urged to live their personal lives in a missionary key: they are sent by Jesus to the world not only to carry out, but also and above all to live the mission entrusted to them; not only to bear witness, but also and above all to be witnesses of Christ."

A crucial aspect of our missionary work is to remember that we are not sent to represent ourselves, but to give witness to the risen Lord. Pope Francis makes this point when he emphasises that "The essence of the mission is to bear witness to Christ, that is, to his life, passion, death and resurrection for the love of the Father and of humanity. Not by chance did the apostles look for Judas' replacement among those who, like themselves, had been witnesses of the Lord's resurrection (cf. Acts 1:21). Christ, indeed, Christ risen from the dead, is the One to whom we must testify and whose life we must share. Missionaries of Christ are not sent to communicate themselves, to exhibit their persuasive qualities and abilities or their managerial skills. Instead, theirs is the supreme honour of presenting Christ in words and deeds, proclaiming to everyone the Good News of his salvation, as the first apostles did, with joy and boldness."

In order that our witness may be taken seriously, Pope Francis emphasises the

importance of integrity of life, because, citing Paul VI, he reminds us “Modern man listens more willingly to witnesses than to teachers, and if he does listen to teachers, it is because they are witnesses.”

While emphasising the importance of ‘witness’ the pope also reiterates the importance of proclaiming Christ’s life and his message. Once again, quoting Paul VI, he went on to say: “Preaching, the verbal proclamation of a message, is indeed always indispensable... The word remains ever relevant, especially when it is the bearer of the power of God. This is why Saint Paul’s axiom, “Faith comes from what is heard” (Rom10:17), also retains its relevance: it is the word that is heard which leads to belief” (ibid., 42).

Moving on to the segment “to the ends of the earth”, the Holy Father highlights the geographical growth of the mission, “beginning with Jerusalem, which Jewish tradition considered the centre of the world, to Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth.” This clearly manifests the universal character of the Church and her mission as she goes forth “in fidelity to her call to bear witness to Christ the Lord and guided by divine providence in the concrete conditions of her life.”

Noting the persecution of the early disciples, and their fidelity to the mission of Christ, the Pope draws attention to the plight of so many migrants today. In doing so he emphasises the importance of pastoral care for migrants, while also recognising that “the presence of faithful of various nationalities enriches the face of parishes and makes them more universal, more Catholic. Consequently, the pastoral care of migrants should be valued as an important missionary activity that can also help the local faithful to rediscover the joy of the Christian faith they have received.”

Finally, in the last part of the message the pope reminds us that it is the Holy Spirit that animates, strengthens, and empowers all who share in the mission of Christ. Focussing on the passage “You will receive the strength from the Holy Spirit”, his

holiness reminds us that “Just as “no one can say ‘Jesus is Lord’, except by the Holy Spirit” (1 Cor 12:3), so no Christian is able to bear full and genuine witness to Christ the Lord without the Spirit’s inspiration and assistance. All Christ’s missionary disciples are called to recognize the essential importance of the Spirit’s work, to dwell in his presence daily and to receive his unfailing strength and guidance. Indeed, it is precisely when we feel tired, unmotivated or confused that we should remember to have recourse to the Holy Spirit in prayer. Let me emphasize once again that prayer plays a fundamental role in the missionary life, for it allows us to be refreshed and strengthened by the Spirit as the inexhaustible divine source of renewed energy and joy in sharing Christ’s life with others.”

At the end of his message, the Pope highlights the significant anniversaries and upcoming celebrations of the *Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples*, the *Society for the Propagation of the Faith*, the *Society of the Holy Childhood* and the *Society of St. Paul the Apostle* and points to the support that these societies offer for the evangelising mission of the church, inspired as they are by the “actions of the Holy Spirit.”

Pope Francis concludes his message with the words “Dear brothers and sisters, I continue to dream of a completely missionary Church, and a new era of missionary activity among Christian communities. I repeat Moses’ great desire for the people of God on their journey: “Would that all the Lord’s people were prophets!” (Num 11:29). Indeed, would that all of us in the Church were what we already are by virtue of baptism: prophets, witnesses, missionaries of the Lord, by the power of the Holy Spirit, to the ends of the earth! Mary, Queen of the Missions, pray for us!”

Official Logo of Jubilee 2025 Unveiled



The Vatican has unveiled the official Logo of the upcoming Jubilee Year due to be held in 2025. The theme of the Holy Year of grace and pilgrimage will be '*Pilgrims of Hope*'.

In February this year, the *Pontifical Council for the New Evangelization*, now contained within the new *Dicastery for Evangelization*, launched a competition inviting people to submit their suggestions for a logo based on the motto: "*Pilgrims of Hope*."

The former Council's President, Archbishop Rino Fisichella, in revealing the logo, reported that a total of 294 entries were received from 213 cities and 48 different countries, noting that participants ranged in age from 6 to 83.

During the judging, the works were identified only by a number so that the author remained anonymous.

On June 11th, Archbishop Fisichella submitted the three final projects to Pope Francis to select the one that struck him the most. "After looking at the projects several times and expressing his preference, the project of Giacomo Travisani was chosen," Archbishop Fisichella said.

Giacomo Travisani, who was present at the launch, reflected on what motivated his submission. He said how he had imagined all people moving forward together, able to push

ahead "thanks to the wind of Hope that is the Cross of Christ and Christ himself."

The Logo shows four stylized figures to indicate all of humanity from the four corners of the earth. They each embrace one another, indicating the solidarity and brotherhood that must unite peoples. The first figure is clinging to the Cross. The underlying waves are choppy to indicate that the pilgrimage of life is not always on calm waters.

Because often personal circumstances and world events call for a greater sense of hope, a description of the Logo says, the lower part of the Cross is elongated turning into an anchor, which dominates the movement of the waves. Anchors often have been used as metaphors for hope.

The image shows how the pilgrim's journey is not individual, but rather communal, with the signs of a growing dynamism that moves more and more toward the Cross.

"The Cross is not static," Fisichella suggested, "but dynamic, bending toward and meeting humanity as if not to leave it alone, but rather offering the certainty of its presence and the reassurance of hope."

The Jubilee 2025 Motto, *Pilgrims of Hope* is also clearly visible in the color green.

significant places that represent all the people who have disappeared or suffered a violent death." "There is a wound to heal and there is the strength that the country needs today to build peace." In the Masses on the last day of July, the 31st, everyone is invited to pray for the executioners and for the conversion of their hearts: "They are also our brothers and sisters and they need our prayers. No more violence in our country".

The Mexican Episcopal Conference, the Conference of Major Superiors of Religious of Mexico and the Mexican Province of the Society of Jesus, has invited Bishops, priests, members of religious life, faithful and people of good will of Mexico, to "pray together for justice and reconciliation for peace". In their joint statement the three bodies declare:

"The murders and disappearances that are committed daily in the country are a call from God to unite to ask for peace. The spilled blood of these brothers and sisters is the blood of Jesus that falls to the earth to make it fertile and to embark on a path of peace. That is why we call for a Day of Prayer for Peace. We need to be united at this time when the indignation of our people, in the face of the barbarity of violence, is opening a door for peace for us".

The message, sent to the Information service of the Pontifical Mission Societies, offers some recommendations for this period. First of all, on July 10th, it is requested "to remember all the priests, men and women religious who have been murdered in the country and offer the intention of the Eucharist for their lives so that their pain may accompany us on this path for the peace". Photographs of these men and women who gave their lives for the people of God and received a violent death will be displayed in the churches. For this month of July, it is suggested to celebrate Holy Masses or to organise community prayers "in

Each Diocese, Religious Congregation or Parish will define the actions to be undertaken on this path for peace, such as hours of adoration, processions for peace, messages on social networks. "Today we need stories of hope, images in which we see the community praying and asking for peace" underline the signatories of the Message. "Our commitment is for social dialogue to build a path of justice and reconciliation that will lead us to peace. We are facing a complex problem that needs everyone to address it from the root and thus allow the Risen Christ to bring forth a new perspective that allows the agreements that Mexico needs today to be built". Finally, the signatories entrust themselves to the Virgin of Guadalupe, "who has always accompanied the people of God in the most difficult moments in her history."

A total of 47 pastoral workers, which includes priests, nuns, seminarians, brothers, lay workers and others within the Catholic church, have been killed in Mexico since 2005, according to data collected by Fides, the information service of the Pontifical Mission Societies. Pope Francis to Appoint Two Women to the Vatican's Dicastery for Bishops.



Pope Francis has announced that he intends to appoint two women to the Vatican's Dicastery for Bishops, a historic first for the office tasked with advising the pontiff on which Catholic priests to appoint as bishops across the world.

"Two women will be appointed for the first time in the committee to elect bishops in the Congregation for Bishops," Francis told Philip Pullella, the Reuters' Vatican correspondent, in an interview that took place on the 2nd of July and was published on the 6th of July.

This historic change comes about with the promulgation of the Vatican's new Apostolic constitution titled *Praedicate Evangelium* ("Preach the Gospel"). The new document stresses that evangelization is the central task of the church, and highlights the role of all of the baptised in the church's mission.

Significantly, the constitution notes that "any member of the faithful can preside over a dicastery," a major shift which opens up leadership roles which were once reserved for

cardinals or bishops to all the baptised.

In the newly published interview, Pope Francis said that the "Vatican's office for Education and Culture and the Apostolic Library are among those that could be headed by a lay man or woman in the near future." The pope did not say when such changes or the new appointments to the Dicastery for Bishops will take effect. The office is currently headed by Cardinal Marc Quelet, a 78-year old cardinal who is likely coming to the end of his term of office.

Francis' decision to include women in the membership of one of the Vatican's most influential departments comes on the heels of his appointments of three religious sisters to high-ranking posts inside three prominent Vatican offices and the appointment of Argentinian theologian Emilce Cuda as the co-secretary of the Pontifical Commission for Latin America, all within the last year.

"Things are opening up a bit," the pope told Reuters.
